## **Teach Vowel Chart Sections**

- 1. There is one more thing to know about the Vowel Chart.
- 2. You will be learning short vowel sounds and long vowel sounds.
- 3. Short vowel sounds are on the left side of the chart (pointing to the left side).
- 4. Long vowel sounds are on the right side (pointing to the right side).
- $\rightarrow$  5. <u>name</u>, which side are the short vowels on?

S. says 'short vowels are on the left side'.

– Repeat Step 5 with 3 more students.

Relate Sound to Vowel Chart: Short a

- 1. The guideword for 'short a' is 'apple' (pointing to 'apple' on the Vowel Chart).
- 2. Point to 'apple' on your Vowel Chart (showing where).

SS. point to 'apple' on their chart.

→ 3. <u>name</u>, what is the guideword for /ăăăăă/? S. says 'apple'.

Repeat Step 3 with each student.

- 4. Remember, the left side of the Vowel Chart is for short vowel sounds (pointing to the title 'Short Vowel Sounds').
- → 5. <u>name</u>, what kind of vowel sounds are on the left side of the Vowel Chart (pointing to the title 'Short Vowel Sounds')?

S. says 'short vowels' or 'short vowel sounds'.

– Repeat Step 5 with each student.

- 6. /ăăăăă/ (making motion) is a short vowel sound, so 'apple' is on the left side of the Vowel Chart.
- → 7. <u>name</u>, why is 'apple' on the left side of the Vowel Chart (pointing to 'apple')?

S. says 'because /ăăăăă/ is a short vowel sound'.

– Repeat Step 7 with each student.
